ber of Hilo Sailing Org and that you earn qualification on each of the boat types. Hilo Sailing Org is the Limited Liability Corporation that owns all the club boats. Eligibility for membership in Hilo Sailing Org requires that you be a current member of Na Hoa Holomoku of Hawaii and a \$50 annual membership fee. Your \$50 annual membership fee is used to maintain moorings in Reeds Bay

for the club use. If you intend to use boats on <u>other</u> than club sail days then please send your dues to the club address on this flyer with a check to Hilo Sailing Org in the amount of \$50.

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The jibe is a maneuver which allows you to point to a course downwind and change tacks as the wind changes or as you change your course.

CONTROLLED JIBING

HAUL THE MIND - IL BOOM IS OVER TRANSOM - BEGIN EASING TILLER AWAY FROM SAIL

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Skipper, "Prepare to jibe."

Crew. "Ready" Skipper, "Helm's to windward."

SAIL SWINGS ACROSS -- CREW SHIFTS

As the boom crosses from one side to the other it is appropriate To let crew and passengers know of the danger by loudly calling "jibeho."

Skipper, "Ease the main."

Skipper, "Jibe the jib."

Crew, "Aye."

Turning of boat must be stopped here to prevent a knockdown or capsite.


CHECK TURNING OF BOAT BY MOVING TILLER AWAY FROM SAIL

It is very important that the Skipper and the crew understand what their role is in this maneuver. In the Sunfish there is no jib sail and the crew will be handling the mainsheet so as the Skipper gives the orders, the crew needs to act quickly to carry them out at the same time letting the Skipper know that the order is understood by saying "aye" or "ok" or "yes."
