

In order to get our fleet back into good working order and keep it that way we all need to adopt Dr. Nick Rees's philosophy of "Culture of Care." Simply stated it means that with everything you do on one of these boats consider that it is yours and must last your lifetime.

Rig the boats properly. Lift your daggerboard out and control the boat by holding onto the bow when you come to the beach. Keep it floating until you get help to carry the boat to the boat stands.

Do not let the boat roll in the surf or scrape on the beach coral and sand.

How Far is the Horizon?

Due to the curvature of the earth the higher the height of your eye above sea level the further your horizon.

The formula is 1.17 x the square root of your eye


height in feet. If your eye height is 9 feet then the line of the horizon is 3.51 nautical miles.


Now if you see a tall object such as the top of an 81 foot

lighthouse then you add the two formula results together. Your 3.51 miles and the lighthouse's 10.53 nm for a total of 14.04 nautical miles to the top. Got it????
