
# FATHER AND SON SAIL THE KONA COAST



Ivo and Kekoa Hanza launched from Kawaihae ramp at noon a few weeks ago and sailed south in light northerly winds, but as is usual on the Kona Coast, tacking began as the winds changed. Knowing that their car was safe near a friend's house and armed with loads of food and a tourist map, they cast their cares to the winds and set off on yet another adventure for this father and son team. After making good headway, they spotted what they thought was a hotel. It turned out to be the house of someone quite wealthy, but they turned their attention away from such glamor and chose the path less taken. In only 6 hours and with beautiful Kiholo Bay in sight, they had sailed half of their intended trip already. As they approached Kona Village, the land breezes began and night was falling too rapidly to safely find their way inshore to safe anchorage. They enjoyed their food, shared tales, and drifted out to sea and to sleep for the night with frequent glances towards the shore to be sure of their location. At sunrise from little 13'2" Spencer Makani, they clearly heard the drone of airplanes to indicate their new position. They laughed and tacked all morning in the light winds and

flat seas, arriving at the Kailua ramp in 25 hrs. and 30 miles from their launching point. The sounds of an ukulele caught their attention only to discover, to their surprise, a friend who could return 19 year old Kekoa to Kawaihae to retrieve the car. Upon reflection, what things would they like to be different on their next voyage in the heavy little wooden boat that Dad had built.... a taller mast and perhaps to sail in the opposite direction were a couple of things that came to mind. Mainly the shared experiences of a loving father and son were the priceless parts of the trip.

The buddy system of swimming is of no use unless you practice it all the time, and a first-aid kit is useless if it's not aboard when it's needed. In other words, to have "fun", you have to have forethought.


Best wishes to Ed Ha who is on the Mainland due to illness in the family. We miss you , Ed.

Hand operated bilge pump—diaphram type


EPIRB—any type


