These pictures make it appear calm, but actually it was quite windy. We got some practice in John's Sabot, Pat's Force 5, Peter's 15' powerboat, and Barry's 8' West Marine dinghy with 2hp engine.



Our first two class days were Dec. 1 & 2. There were 11 students in all including the four from the Kona side. We had classroom sessions in the morning and sailing time in the afternoon when the wind calmed to a safe speed. Most of the Hilo group sailed in boats we had never been in before, so we have to do lots of practice and much more studying before the final two classes on Dec. 15 & 16. We camped in an open shelter with winds at 30 mph. gusting to 40 most of the night. It was a rather wild time. Mauricio dreamed he was closing the hatches and reefing all night. We all returned home bruised or sore and exhausted, but exhilarated. It was a great time to further bond together as a team and friends. Some of us will probably





Boating Emergency Response Team (BERT) – Thanks to the quick response of Barry, Mauricio, Larry, David, Joyce, Pat, Carl and Roger who all responded when John Messina's "Grenadier" needed to be rescued from the rocks Sunday, the 11th after a mooring shackle let go in the early morning. Boat escaped with a bent prop and some fiberglass repair needed. Just a couple of days later "Sugar Blues" went adrift, and thanks to quick action to keep her off the rocks and phone calls by Mike Thomas, owner Larry Peck put her back on a stable mooring. John Messina's keen eyes spotted "Pueo" moving off her mooring and reported it

to Ed Ha. On Sunday the 25th, Carl Shioji in his boat and Barry in Peter Boucher's boat towed in a jet ski and passengers when it was unable to make it back to shore. "Flying Cloud" was rescued from going aground by the quick action of Larry, Barry, and Mauricio this last month as well. Jim Lucas was able to put "Eva II" onto a mooring after she went sailing unskippered when her owner was out of town. Thanks to all of you for keeping a sharp eye out for everything to do with boats in our harbor.





Three of our ladies attended the Wahine Racing Clinic sponsored by the Kona Sailing Club on Saturday, Nov 17 at Honokohau Harbor. Clare Lyon from the UH Hilo sailing group was the instructor. She taught from her considerable knowledge and experience in small boat sailing. Four from the university group accompanied her. Our three lady sailors were Joyce French, Paola Barbis, and Pat Bolln. In the afternoon they all headed their boats out to the race course to practice starting line procedures and get used to the boats that had been graciously loaned to them. Their vessel was a Bayfield 25 owned by Al Jaeger. He accompanied them on the boat since it was new to them. A large group of ladies attended filling ten boats. At the end of the day, our ladies relaxed with a swim and a nice dinner, and then retired to the King Kam Hotel for a break in their normal daily responsibilities, and hoped they did not disturb you here in Hilo with their laughter. The racing took place on Sunday, Nov. 18th. After pre-race instructions at 9:30am., the boats were made ready and headed for the starting line. The winds had increased to about 15-18 knots. There were actually three races and some great opportunities to practice the new techniques and strategies that Clare had taught. Many of the Kona Sailing Club men were out in the remaining boats to encourage all the ladies. They were treated to a very impressive show of sailing skill. Our Hilo threesome crossed
